


# Top 10 Little Things We Miss in WDW

- Ice Station Cool, located in Innoventions in Epcot, originally opened around 1998, and was home to a frozen Neanderthal man by the name of Refreshus \_\_\_\_\_ reaching for a Coca-Cola product.
- Every country in the World Showcase and even some of the Future World pavilions hosts these children activity areas. (3 words)
- The \_\_\_\_\_ Steak House could be found on the Grand Concourse of the Contemporary Resort from 1994 to 2008.
- What "Peter Pan" character was the namesake of this toy store in Fantasyland, which was open from 1972 to 2010, changing its name to \_\_\_\_\_'s Treasures in 1992?
- Prior to #5 Down, and originating in DCA in 2003, moving to DAK in 2005, this was the first audioanimatronic figure to walk independently and interact with guests. (\_\_\_\_\_ the Dinosaur)
- Disney created this special character for the Florida Citrus Growers, who sponsored the Sunshine Pavilion in the MK from 1971 to 1986. (2 words)

- One of the 'relatives' of #20 Down could be found in the AK, a talking, roving tree known as \_\_\_\_\_.
- While the Imagination Pavilion is still (for a limited time?) open for business, the walk-around unique characters of the purple dragon, \_\_\_\_\_ with his handler, Dreamfinder could be seen interacting with guests until 1998.
- From the opening of the Imagination Pavilion in 1982 to its closure in 1998, this hands-on interactive area on the second floor of the pavilion included activities such as the Rainbow Corridor and Stepping Stones.
- Originally, \_\_\_\_\_ for more popular attractions came in the form of paper tickets, which ended around 2014, that could easily be collected or given to other guests.
- The \_\_\_\_\_ Center in the Contemporary Resort until it closed in 2007, provided after park evening entertainment for guests, including video games, air hockey, and even a small theater.
- The \_\_\_\_\_ of \_\_\_\_\_ were a Christmas light display that ran for Epcot's Holidays Around the World from 1994 to 2008. They were a series of archways that covered the promenade between Future World and World Showcase with over 30,000 lights that danced to the area's music loop.
- An interactive, plush Mickey that was modified to interact with the guest, depending on its location in the parks with corny jokes and inside info, and was available for rental or purchase from 2003 to 2008. (2 words)
